Dreamlike Evening Atmosphere in the Rauris Primeval Forest

- Level of difficulty:** Moderate snowshoe hike or winter walk that requires more stamina or leads through steeper terrain.
- Equipment:** Sturdy, ankle-high footwear (ideally hiking boots); warm socks, ski poles, warm clothing (including hat and gloves), alpine backpack with hot drinks and snacks; ski helmet (recommended), sleds (available for rent for a fee).
- Costs:** € 22,- adults; Children and young people (10–16 yrs) free when accompanied by their parents. Free with the "Gästecard" or Nationalpark WinterCard!
- Included in price:** Snowshoe and ski stick hire (please advise when booking)
- Dogs:** Bringing dogs along is not permitted during excursions out of consideration for other participants and the local wildlife.
- Meeting point:** Tuesday, December 22, 2026, at 2:00 PM;
Wednesday, January 20, 2027, at 2:30 PM;
Friday, February 19, 2027, at 3:00 PM;
Saturday, March 20, 2027, at 3:30 PM.
Meeting point: Parking lot Bodenhaus, Kolmstraße 6, 5661 Rauris
- How to reach us:** By the "Tälerbus" or by car to the Bodenhaus parking lot.
Coordinates (N/S 47.10510, W/O 12.99169).
- Duration:** Approx. 4 hours
- Pure walking time:** Approx. 2.5 hours
- Route:** Approx. 5–5.5 kilometres
- Ascent:** Approx. 150 vertical metres
- Refreshment stops:** Various options available, for example: Naturfreundehaus
- Booking:** Up to **three hours** before the start of the excursion.

Description: Before the actual hike begins, a taxi service takes the group to the Lenzanger parking area. From there, the joint tour with the national park ranger sets off into the evening atmosphere – the last rays of sunlight bathe the mountain world in warm light. After a short stretch through the forest, quiet clearings open up, offering particularly impressive views of the sunset. As dusk slowly falls, the relaxed descent over snow-covered alpine meadows leads toward the inn. Participants can then decide whether to accompany the ranger back to the parking lot or let the atmospheric evening come to a close at the inn.

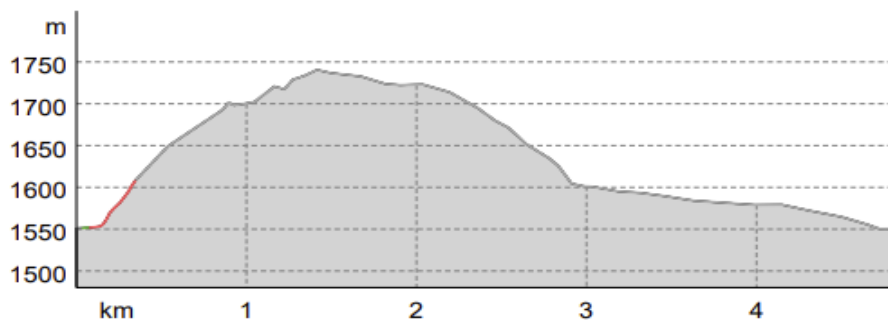




Educational content:

- a. Guests learn about the importance and roles of large protected areas – especially national parks.
- b. Guests recognize the difference between how landscapes are used by humans, flora, and fauna during the day and at night.
- c. Visitors become familiar with the concept of “disturbance” and are able to assess their own behavior when using natural areas.
- d. Guests learn the meaning of the term “light pollution” based on the places they visit.
- e. Visitors learn to distinguish different wild animals by identifying their tracks (footprints, pellets, etc.).
