



Hollersbach valley winter adventure

Off the beaten track

- Level of difficulty:** Medium-difficulty snowshoe or winter hike requiring good fitness and involving steeper terrain.
- Equipment:** Sturdy, ankle-high footwear (ideally hiking boots); warm socks, ski sticks, warm clothing (including hat and gloves), sunscreen, alpine rucksack with warm drinks and snacks.
- Costs:** € 22 adults; Children and young people (10–16 yrs) free when accompanied by their parents. Free with the "Gästecard" or Nationalpark WinterCard!
- Included in price:** Snowshoe and ski stick hire (please advise when booking).
- Dogs:** Bringing dogs along is not permitted during excursions out of consideration for other participants and the local wildlife.
- Meeting point:** Every Wednesday (from 23.12.26–31.03.27) at 10:30 from the Hollersbachtal car park, coordinates (N/S 47.26758; W/O 12.41441).
- How to reach us:** By bus to Hollersbach, then approx 10 minute walk (route 670, "Hollersbach im Pinzgau Ortsmitte" bus stop) or car to the Hollersbachtal car park.
- Duration:** Approx. 3.5–4 hours
- Pure walking time:** Approx. 3 hours
- Route:** Approx. 5 kilometres
- Ascent:** Approx. 250-350 vertical metres
- Refreshment stops:** No refreshment stop available
- Booking:** Up to **three hours** before the start of the excursion; registration at np.bildung@salzburg.gv.at or at npht.at/hollersbach-valley

Description: The Hollersbach Valley is especially charming during the winter months. Snow-covered forests, mountain meadows blanketed in hoarfrost, and sparkling streams adorned with ice make this excursion particularly rewarding. Animal tracks reveal the winter life of the local wildlife. Along old and hidden paths through the wintry forest, clearings repeatedly offer views of the snow-covered Hollersbach and Salzach valleys. An ideal snowshoe hike, far from the tourist trails.

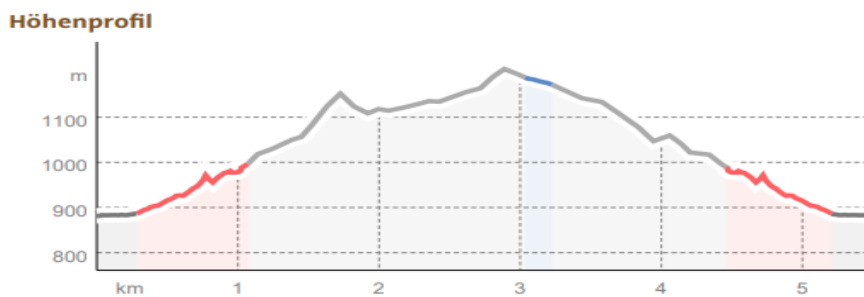




Educational content:

- a. Guests learn about the importance and functions of large protected areas – especially national parks.
- b. Guests recognize the particular challenges faced by wildlife and plant life in the montane mountain forest zone.
- c. After the excursion, visitors are able to recognize the contrast between intensively used winter sports areas and quieter protected areas.
- d. Guests learn about the different interests in the region (nature conservation, water management, etc.) based on the location.
- e. Changing weather conditions and climatic factors in relation to natural hazards are discussed and applied to planning their own tours.
- f. Guests learn to distinguish different wild animals by identifying their tracks (footprints, pellets, etc.).
